Despite there being one overall winner on the day, the event was a fantastic success for all those involved. The House spirit was unbelievable as the girls wore their House colours with pride and their commitment in the events was brilliant to see.

Time Capsule Secrets Uncovered Live on TV

Barely recovered from the excitement of the bomb discovered at Hope House, another piece of school history made the headlines in June when a time capsule, which had been buried for nearly 40 years at the site of our former junior school, was opened live on BBC Points West in front of thousands of viewers.

After a tip-off from former teachers and pupils, an eagle-eyed demolition contractor successfully extracted the long-hidden time capsule from a cavity wall of the Gloucester Hall building. The opening of the hall in 1977, along with the Queen's Silver Jubilee, was marked by secreting a small time capsule in the fabric of the new building.

The time capsule was discovered by the same contractors who had unearthed

the WW2 unexploded bomb on site a few weeks previously. Linking these two intriguing glimpses of bygone times, the BBC invited representatives of the school, past and present, to open the capsule live on regional news.

Hazarding a few guesses as to its contents, our Registrar Lynda Bevan, Jane Millington a Bath High Alumna and our current Finance Officer, and Tilly Kennard from Year 3 all took to the studio sofa with Points West presenters Alex Lovell and David Garmston for the moment of truth...which fortunately did not disappoint!

As well as penning various letters, the girls of 1977 had chosen a scrap of fabric from their summer uniform and a school tie; a model Mini – 'the form of transport we

use every day'; a school prospectus and a commemorative Silver Jubilee coin amongst other things to give future generations a snapshot of their school life in the 1970s.

Media interest in this story sparked a flurry of nostalgia on social media from Bath High Alumnae, some of whom remembered the capsule, but had little recollection of what was in it. Jessica Saunders, (BHS 1964-78) identified the dilemma we had all faced on discovering it: 'I find it rather moving. They probably did expect it to be hidden for longer. But 40 years isn't bad!'



House News

Do you still feel allegiance to your house? Is your house colour your default choice for shoes, cars, coats or walls? The house system has seen many changes over the decades and between our three schools, from the names of impressive generals in the days of the Royal School, to Bath's sweeping Crescents for Bath High School, to the inspiring women with a connection to Bath who give our Royal High School houses their names today.

These four current houses have been given a fresh injection of energy, not just by the dedicated efforts of House Leaders and Prefects who work tirelessly to rally the enthusiasm and determination of their House Members, but also by appointing Staff Heads of House. Nominally this was a move to support and encourage greater participation between girls and staff, but judging by the individuals appointed, we all know that a whole new level of competitiveness is upon us!



Assembly seating configured by houses rather than year groups, and a new House Quiz this term are some of the ways that the profile of this system is being raised across school, in an effort to foster teamwork across year groups. A joyously colourful display at Sports Day this summer at the University of Bath brought house camaraderie between the Senior and Junior schools too. This fresh effort towards team spirit and determination reflects perfectly the bold and pioneering stories of the women after whom are houses are named: Austen, DuPre; Wollstonecraft and Bronte. Each a brave and groundbreaking woman in her own field, even a brief consideration of

their achievements in their day is inspiring. So much so to one alumnae, that she is now fundraising in the memory of her house's figurehead. Here's her story:



Remembering Mary

"I do not wish [women] to have power
over men, but over themselves."

I first stumbled upon Mary Wollstonecraft when as a nervous 11 year old I was put in to Wollstonecraft House at RHSB. Not long after I was throwing myself in to the house spirit and found myself shuffling about in the dance house competition, swimming in the house galas, winning (and losing!) house points and all in the name of Mary.

Since leaving in 2008, however, ashamedly I have to admit I hadn't given her much thought. That was until I found myself nearly 8 years later at an evening by the campaign group 'Mary on the Green' whose sole mission is to raise a sculpture in memory of the lady herself. I hadn't quite grasped or remembered just how amazing a woman she had been and was intrigued to find out that amongst other things Wollstonecraft had been the first female war correspondent and salaried journalist, a pioneering activist for human rights, author of 'A vindication of the Rights of Woman' the first book in English arguing for the equality of women and men and most poignant for me an educational pioneer who became the first woman to argue for the education of girls!

It was at this evening that I met the author and Wollstonecraft enthusiast Bee Rowlatt who, amongst others, spoke passionately about Wollstonecraft and who in her book 'In Search of Mary' chronicles her life, influences, loves and achievements. It was there that she spoke persuasively about the importance of the campaign's work, revealing that astonishingly more than nine out of ten of London's statues are of men. "For five years now we've been campaigning for this to change." Rowlatt explained "The issue is women's visibility. I want my daughters to see that women throughout history have contributed to the world in vital and significant ways."

It's not just Rowlatt who believes that it is high time Wollstonecraft receives the recognition she deserves. The Nobel Laureate Amartya Sen has called her "perhaps the most underestimated thinker of the Enlightenment." The historian Mary Beard also too feels strongly and explains that, "every woman who wants to make an impact on the way this country is run, from the House of Commons to the pub quiz, has Mary Wollstonecraft to thank."

Rowlatt continued to explain that a large part of the campaign's work is about redressing the narrative of thousands of years: the narrative in which only triumphant military men achieve visibility. She, however, does hasten to add that she's not remotely interested in taking anyone's statue down. "It's just high time we got some new ones. So that school kids in Hackney, Liverpool and Manchester can look up to people who look a bit more like them; people who achieved great things and are finally recognised as having done so."

Alumna Pip Balshaw Relives an Unforgettable Experience for an Indefatigable Monarch

On Saturday 11th June myself, along with various Air cadets from across the South West Region, were selected to participate in the Flypast for the Queen's 90th Birthday. The cadets were chosen for being the best representatives of the Air Training Corps - and a few were even selected to be interviewed by Blue Peter!

We flew on the A330 Voyager aircraft - which was formatted alongside the 2 Euro Typhoons, and flew just in front of the Red Arrows. All the cadets were required to meet at RAF Brize Norton for 8am, and for approximately 2 hours we were busy signing in, filling out various admin forms and exploring the base hanger which held various Parachuting equipment.

At about 10am, we headed out to the airfield and boarded the aircraft; my friends and I had strategically placed ourselves so that we would be the first on the Voyager and could sit by the window seats in order to see the Typhoons. We then flew out from Brize to Norfolk and the North Sea, where the Typhoons and (other aircraft in the formation) were awaiting us. Following that, we then flew back across Norwich towards London for the Flypast at 1am. I have to say, there is something very pleasing about drinking good quality (and free) coffee, watching a Typhoon flying alongside the window, whilst 10,000ft up in the air.



Join the Navy, See the World

Imogen Cornick (RHS Class of 2008) knew she wasn't a 9-5 kind of girl. Read her story of taking to the seas...



I left RHS in 2008 having attended both the junior and senior school and I pretty much loved every second! After leaving school I went to the University of Birmingham where I studied a joint honours in Metallurgy & Sports Science. As it neared graduation in 2011, I realised, although the subject I was reading interested me, the jobs in the industry didn't. From a young age I had known I never wanted to work in a 9-5 office, so when I realised a job in metallurgy would largely involve a 9-5 in a lab looking down a microscope-I knew it wasn't for me.

This is where my life took a rather rapid U-Turn.... My parents announced they were

emigrating to California, and as I wasn't eligible for a VISA, I couldn't join them. I suddenly found myself In a situation, many find themselves in, where I was nearing the end of University and looking at a near future with no job, the prospect of paying rent and no idea what I wanted to do!



Whilst talking to a family friend I came across a job I hadn't even heard of and let alone considered.... Driving Ships. With further research it appeared to have a lot to offer, tax free salary, travel, and a paid training programme, so I applied and miraculously got the job. To say a life at sea was a culture shock is an understatement. For someone

whose prior seagoing experience involved a day trip on a catamaran on the school's sports tour to Barbados, I was initially out of my depth and it was a very steep learning curve.



Fast forward 5 years and I have just obtained my 'Chief Mates Unlimited/Master 3000GT Certificate', allowing me to work on any merchant vessel of unlimited size at the rank of Chief Mate or as a Captain of a vessel up to 3000GT. For me, this means driving a cruise ship, currently at the rank of third officer. I have recently disembarked P&O Cruise's 'Aurora', having completed a full westbound circumnavigation of the world and last year, an extended trip around South America, across the Pacific Ocean to Australia and New Zealand.

This job, a career in the merchant navy, has given me an amazing opportunity to see the world, and even better, get paid for it. I has also opened the door to so many experiences I never would have had otherwise. For Example, In 2012 I was asked to represent the merchant navy as part of the military muster during the Festival of

Remembrance at the Royal Albert Hall, followed by the service and march at the Cenotaph. It was one of the most incredible weekends and one I'm not likely to forget.



It's safe to say that I feel I have fallen on my feet, however I honestly believe that so much of the success I have experienced so far and who I am, is down to the brilliant foundations built at school. A self confidence that is gained through a fully supportive environment, teachers who genuinely want you to succeed and friendships that withstand, well in my case, quite literally, being oceans apart.


